Dear Applicant,

Thank you for your interest in the Neurobiology of Trauma, Train-the-Trainer program! We are excited to bring you this curriculum and for the possibility that you will become a trainer who delivers this curriculum to other groups and organizations.

The curriculum for this training is focused on the neurobiology of trauma, impact on survivors of sexual and interpersonal trauma, and practical implications for professionals who work with survivors, including approaches to working with other professionals and attention to vicarious trauma and self-care. This training is geared toward professionals in the areas of Law Enforcement, Advocates, Mental Health Clinicians, and Prosecutors.

Participation in 5 weekly one-hour conference calls and one (1) 2-day, in-person training session is required as a part of this training program. Given that training spots are limited, preference will be given to applicants who indicate they can make all of the conference calls and the in-person training.

Once you have completed the training requirements [see attached] you will have access to the training materials. These materials become a part of your training portfolio and the expectation is that you would be available to give a minimum of 2 trainings per year. These trainings may be a result of your initiating contact with local organizations and agencies, or organizations requesting training from you. At a later time, you will also have the option to apply to become a paid trainer through the Office of Victims of Crime (OVC).

Neurobiology of Trauma Train-the-Trainer:

Trainers:

Hilary Hodgdon, Ph.D., is a clinical psychologist specializing in complex trauma in children, adolescents and adults. She is the Director of Research at the Trauma Center at Justice Resource Institute (TC-JRI), where she oversees treatment outcome research on novel interventions for traumatic stress. She is the PI of a multi-site community based effectiveness trial of the ARC intervention model for maltreated children. Dr. Hodgdon is the Co-Director of the Complex Trauma Treatment Network, a Category II Training and Technical Assistance center of the National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN) funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMHSA). She is the Director of the LAMP Curriculum Development Project. Dr. Hodgdon is a certified trainer in the Child Welfare Toolkit and Resource Parent Curriculums of the NCTSN and the Attachment, Regulation and Competency (ARC) framework for children with complex trauma. Dr. Hodgdon has provided training in the neurobiology and developmental impact of complex trauma and evidenced based interventions for traumatic stress to a variety of provider groups including social workers, mental health practitioners, and administrative, milieu and nursing staff at outpatient, residential, inpatient and community mental health settings. Dr. Hodgdon received her Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology at Temple University in Philadelphia. Her research interests center on the crossover of youth from the child welfare to juvenile justice systems, the impact of early trauma on the development of psychopathology during adolescence, longitudinal outcomes of trauma-impacted youth and innovative treatments for complex trauma.

Shavonne J. Moore, Ph.D., is a licensed psychologist who received her Doctorate in Counseling Psychology, from Purdue University. She completed her pre-doctoral training at Boston University School of Medicine / Center for Multicultural Training in Psychology, and her post-doctoral training at the Veteran Affairs (VA) Healthcare System in Boston. These two career endeavors symbolize her longstanding focus on trauma, multiculturalism, and diversity. Her clinical work continues to focus around services for marginalized populations who have experienced lifelong traumas. She is the Director of Clinical Training for a clinical psychology doctoral program, at The Chicago School of Professional Psychology. She is also the co-founder and former Director of a sexual victimization prevention tasks force based in Boston, MA. She has a strong passion for engaging communities in efforts to end sexual victimization through direct attention to intersecting implications of ethnicity and religion.

Elizabeth Power, M.Ed is an internationally sought after interdisciplinary consultant and educator. Educated at Vanderbilt University's Peabody School of Education, she focuses on helping organizations become trauma-responsive. Her firm is an authorized provider of Sidran Institute's Risking Connection[®], and she is an adjunct instructor in the Department of Psychiatry at Georgetown University, teaching Trauma Informed Medical Care and assisting professors as they develop curriculum. Power's work includes the development of programs that integrate indigenous values into trauma-informed processes. She has over three decades of experience working in programs addressing

traumatic experiences including the North Carolina Rape Crisis Association, the NCTSN, and the NCPTSD.

Training Requirements:

This training is primarily intended for Law Enforcement, Advocates, Mental Health Clinicians, and Prosecutors who have some experience with basic presentation and facilitation skills.

Participation in weekly conference calls – these calls will take place with trainers and trainees, and are intended to help you become familiar with the training curriculum before the in-person meetings. Supplemental learning materials (e.g., readings, videos, background information and content) may be assigned before and/or during the calls.

Participation in 2 day in person-training – the in-person trainings will take place in 3 cities – Boston, Chicago, and Washington D.C. You only need to attend the training in one city.

We ask that trainers commit to delivering a minimum of 2 trainings per year. Training could occur within your own agency, with community partners and / or through training contracts initiated by the OVC Training and Technical Assistance Center (TTAC).
